We are a nationally prestigious merit scholarship program and community that helps exceptional students become meaningful leaders throughout society.

The first Stamps Scholars programs launched in 2006 at the University of Michigan and Georgia Tech. The program has since grown to nearly 40 schools across the country with more than 1,000 current and alumni Stamps Scholars. More than 200 new Stamps Scholarship recipients in 2016 will join the nearly 550 current Scholars.

Stamps Scholars are among the recipients of other prestigious awards, including Rhodes, Fulbright, Goldwater, Marshall and National Science Foundation scholarships.

The 2016 Stamps Scholarship Program

The Stamps Foundation awards multi-year scholarships to driven and talented student leaders to help them achieve their goals. We partner with visionary colleges and universities to enable extraordinary educational experiences.

Prospective students apply directly to one or more of our partner schools to be considered for the Stamps Scholarship. A separate application is usually not required. Schools select Stamps Scholarship nominees to present to the Stamps Foundation.

Scholars receive annual awards that range from \$69,000 to \$5,000 (four-year awards total an average of \$275,000 - \$20,000) with additional funds for enrichment activities such as study abroad, academic conferences, and leadership training. The Stamps Family Charitable Foundation and partner schools evenly share the costs of the awards.

Additional Benefits

- Being part of the Stamps Scholars on-campus & national communities
- Funding to support academic and scientific research projects, cultural & leadership programs, and study abroad
- A national (and increasingly global) alumni network with whom Scholars share a common bond.

Where to Apply

Applying for a Stamps Scholarship is easy: just apply to one or more of our partner schools. If you qualify, you'll automatically be considered for a Stamps award.

The majority of our partner schools don't require a separate application for the Stamps Scholarship, but the application deadline and award process varies from school to school along with the amount of the award. An interview is always part of the process.


Who Should Apply

Since then, the Stamps Scholars community has grown into a national network of visionary colleges and universities who partner with the Stamps Foundation to award multi-year scholarships that help driven and talented student leaders achieve their education and life goals.

Penny Stamps

A graduate of the University of Michigan School of Art & Design and a former teacher and business owner, Penny has always been passionate about education. In 1999, she worked with the University of Michigan School of Art and Design to launch the Roman J. Witt Visiting Professors Program in honor of her late father. She also established the highly successful Penny W. Stamps Distinguished Visitors Lectures Series. In 2012, The Penny W. Stamps School of Art & Design at the University of Michigan was named for her. Penny's philanthropy has earned her numerous honors, including the University of Michigan's 2005 Donald B. Hermelin Award for Volunteer Leadership, the 2013 National Philanthropy Lifetime Achievement Award, and an honorary alumna of Georgia Tech.

Roe Stamps

A private investor and co-founder of the Bostonbased private investment company Summit Partners, Roe is a former Lieutenant in the United States Navy Reserve, an Industrial Engineering graduate of Georgia Tech, and an MBA graduate from Harvard Business School. Since his relocation to South Florida in 1993, Roe, along with his wife Penny, has devoted significant time and resources to philanthropic causes. Roe is a Trustee Emeritus of the Georgia Tech Foundation, and a Trustee at the University of Miami, the John S and James L Knight Foundation and several other distinguished organizations. Roe has received awards from Georgia Tech and Harvard as a distinguished alumnus and an honorary PhD from Georgia Tech in 2014. In 2010, Roe was honored by the American Red Cross South Florida Region as the Humanitarian of the Year.
